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#### Pembroke Regional Hospital Welcomes Three Orthopaedic Surgeons To Its Team

The Pembroke Regional Hospital is excited to announce that three orthopaedic surgeons have been hired to help establish and operate a full service orthopaedic program in our region.

Orthopaedics involves the inpatient and outpatient treatment of injuries and conditions affecting the musculoskeletal system. Repairing broken bones and replacing hip and knee joints, for example, are part of orthopedic services.

"Dr. Christopher de Jesus, Dr. Natasha Holder and Dr. Ingrid Radovanovic are currently in the process of setting up and establishing their practices at the Pembroke Regional Hospital," said PRH President and CEO Pierre Noel, adding that they recently attended a full-day orientation session at the hospital during which they toured the facility and surgical suites, and were introduced to many of their professional colleagues.

"Our new orthopaedic surgeons are highly qualified, are collegial and will be a great fit within our medical team. Family physicians are now being notified of the referral process for our new orthopaedics program and we are anticipating that the surgeons will begin patient consults in late November or early December with surgeries starting in the New Year," Mr. Noel said.

Dr. Christopher de Jesus grew up in Ottawa and completed his undergraduate and medical degrees at the University of Ottawa, before

pursuing residency in Montreal at McGill University. "I decided early on that I would like to dedicate my career to helping people. Orthopaedics was a natural choice for me," Dr. de Jesus said.

"I grew up playing a variety of sports which provided exposure to a variety of injuries. It peaked my interest in anatomy, how to recover from injury and get back to activity as soon as possible. Orthopaedic surgery allows me the opportunity to get people up and moving again doing what they love."

Having worked at the Ottawa Hospital, Dr. de Jesus, who is bilingual, said he has already treated many patients from the Ottawa Valley who had to leave home and travel for hours to receive the care they needed and is pleased to be bringing this care closer to home.

"I believe in bringing the absolute gold standard of care in orthopaedic surgery to the community. I have been trained in an excellent centre by world renowned orthopaedic surgeons and will continue staying up to date to make sure my patients have the best care available," Dr. de Jesus said.

Excited to establish his roots in the region and share his passion for health and fitness with his neighbours and friends, Dr. de Jesus said that his wife Emmeline who is also a physician has already started work in the PRH Emergency department. The couple has three children and enjoy an active lifestyle including running, biking and outdoor sports.

Dr. Natasha Holder also joins us from Ottawa where she completed the Ottawa Orthopaedic surgery residency program in 2014. Since then, she has completed a fellowship in Upper Extremity and Sports Medicine at McMaster University and most recently did a fellowship in Musculoskeletal Oncology at the University of Ottawa.

#### Waste Diversion Success Continues

While the acquisition of new equipment or programs at the Pembroke Regional Hospital often takes the spotlight in terms of health care news, some of the hospital's great stories also happen behind the scenes. One example of this is the success and advancement of the hospital's waste management program.

"We are well ahead of many other hospitals when it comes to waste diversion," said Marilyn Watson, Manager of Environment Services at PRH.

"We are diverting more waste from the landfill site than the average hospital typically would. We are very environmentally





responsible with our regular waste stream and we have now further improved our program by moving to reusable sharps and pharmaceutical waste containers," Ms. Watson said.

Typically, hospitals which have single-use sharps containers or self-service reusable containers must maximize the use of the container in order to minimize the cost to the facility. Ultimately it is most economical to fill each container to the fill line, however, this practice can lead to overfilling and an increased opportunity for exposure and needlestick injuries.

Earlier this year, PRH teamed up with Stericycle to use their Sharps Management Service – a proactive approach to sharps



management through which containers are exchanged and replaced by technicians from Stericycle before over filling. The containers themselves are also improved in terms of design for use, improving staff safety. Ms. Watson said the program is working well.

Dr. Holder received her medical degree in Ireland and both a Master of Science and Bachelor of Science in Physiology from McGill University in Montreal.

"I've wanted to be a doctor since I was five. I chose the field of medicine because I wanted to help people in a direct, lasting and meaningful way. During medical school I was first interested in general surgery, but switched to orthopaedics because of the opportunity to affect permanent and lasting change to patients' lives, and indeed their quality of life," Dr. Holder said.

She added that she is excited to be part of the development of the orthopaedics program at PRH and since her husband is a career officer in the Canadian Forces, she looks forward, in particular, to working with the military community at Garrison Petawawa. "I want to turn Pembroke Regional Hospital into a centre of excellence for orthopaedics in the region, serving patients from both Ontario and Quebec in the language of their choice. Both the military and civilian communities in the area deserve a high standard of care and I want to be part of that," she said.

"Not only have we gained health and safety improvements, but we are also realizing savings, both financially and environmentally. By using the Sharps Management Service, we are saving 4,740 containers from going to landfill which translates into 19,770 pounds of plastic kept out of landfill; 1,527 pounds of cardboard kept out of landfill and the prevention of 11,731 pounds of C02 emissions," she said.

It was noted that in addition to the sharps aspect of the new program, pharmaceutical waste is now sorted more efficiently and is stored more securely, insuring that all waste is being disposed of in a responsible manner.

For the disposal of biomedical waste, PRH has recently contracted services through The Ottawa Hospital so that our hospital is reducing this type of waste being sent to landfill with no additional cost.

## **Work Progressing On Surgical Upgrades**

With orthopaedic surgeries on track to begin in January as part of the new surgical program approved by the Champlain Local Health Integration Network (LHIN), the Pembroke Regional Hospital is now in the process of securing specialized orthopaedic equipment and conducting staff education.

"As you can imagine, this is a very exciting development for our hospital and for those in our region who require orthopaedic care," said Hospital President and CEO Pierre Noel.

On a related note, work is also progressing on the hospital's \$12 million Ministry approved capital project to modernize the inpatient surgical unit and day surgery space. Once complete, these upgrades will provide additional comfort and improved space for all surgical patients.

In support of this project, the Pembroke Regional Hospital Foundation will soon be launching a \$2.5 million fundraising campaign to raise the "local share" of this surgical upgrades

project. As with other capital projects funded by the Ministry of Health and Long-

Term Care, 90% of the cost is provincially funded, while 10% of the cost, plus 100% of the costs to equip the space must be paid for locally. "Recognizing the tremendous job our Foundation and our Auxiliary

have done in fundraising for all of our past projects, and the true generosity of the people in our community, I have no doubt that everyone will rally around this important project as well," Mr. Noel said.

## **Stroke Process Improvements Shorten** Wait Times For Diagnosis And Treatment

When it comes to optimal stroke care, every minute counts which is why the Pembroke Regional Hospital's District Stroke Centre has teamed up with the County of Renfrew Paramedic Service to roll out a new best practice model of care which will help decrease what's known as "door to needle time".

Vascular Health Coordinator Karen Roosen explains that "door to needle time" refers to a specific timeframe within which tPA (Tissue Plasminogen Activator), a clot-busting drug used to treat certain types of strokes, can be administered to a stroke patient who has arrived at the Emergency Department. Although the current door to needle time at PRH has improved significantly by dropping to 46 minutes from 63 over the past 2 years, the provincial benchmark also continues to drop as new procedures are developed.

"By implementing the new procedures, we are striving to reduce our 'door to needle time' to 30 minutes," Mrs. Roosen said. She noted that one of the key components of this initiative involves the stroke patient remaining on the paramedic's stretcher from the time they are triaged and assessed in the Emergency Department through to completion of a CT scan. This initiative is already a best practice in Code Stroke management at Quinte Health Centre in Belleville where local representatives conducted a site visit to learn more about the process and what is required.

For nearly a decade, Pembroke Regional Hospital has had a waste management program in place through which approximately 38.2% of the hospital's waste is diverted from landfill through recycling. This doesn't include e-waste (such as printer cartridges etc.) which is donated to Valour Public School for processing through their own e-waste diversion program.

"Our goal is to continually beef up and improve our recycling program by looking for advanced practices," Ms. Watson said.

Another aspect of the waste management program which makes PRH unique is the recycling of organics. "We are the only hospital in our area that we know of that recycles organics and we've been doing this for a long time. It's a huge weight and a huge diversion program", Ms. Watson said, noting that a total of 18 large green bins full of organics are diverted from landfill and recycled by the Ottawa Valley Waste Recovery Centre each week.

Hospital President and CEO Pierre Noel said there is great pride in knowing how well the hospital is doing in terms of reducing its impact on the



environment. "Our Environmental Services team recognizes the importance of waste management and has taken a lot of initiative to find ways to improve the practices we have in place as a way of protecting and preserving our environment for future generations," Mr. Noel said.

Dave Libby, Acting Chief for the County of Renfrew's Paramedic Service said they are very excited to be part of this initiative recognizing how much of a positive impact it will have on the patients and the community.

As a District Stroke Centre for the region, the Pembroke Regional Hospital is recognized province-wide as being a high performer for the transfer of stroke patients to stroke rehabilitation within five days of admission versus the provincial benchmark of six days.

PRH is also the only site in the Champlain LHIN (Local Health Integration Network) to meet the provincial definition for designation as an integrated stroke unit – which means that all the stroke unit beds for both acute care and rehabilitation are located in the same area of the hospital and a dedicated interprofessional team with stroke expertise (nursing, physiotherapy, occupational therapy and speech-language pathology) is managing the patient's care. The model, which is designed to meet individual stroke care needs, supports a seamless transition of patient care from acute care to rehabilitation.

#### Pembroke Regional Hospital Recognizes Therapeutic Benefit of "Family" At Bedside

they consider "family".

In order to accommodate this at PRH, a distinction was made nearly a decade ago between those our patients consider to be "family" and regular visitors. As part of this, the definition of "family" was revised to include parents, grandparents, spouse or significant other or guardian, child, brother, sister, or the individuals that the patient designates as most significant to their care and who they define as immediate family.

Those considered to be family members by the patients are welcome at any time to participate in care or to offer reassurance and support. A maximum of two family members are welcome at any one time on in-patient units, unless otherwise discussed with the care team. Hours for family

Especially in times of crisis, patients want to have regular access to those visiting are decided on between the patient and his/her care team and a patient's requested visitor restrictions are respected.

> Public visitors are welcome, two at a time, to visit between 11:30 a.m. and 8:30 p.m. However, a patient's care team is happy to look at ways to accommodate exceptions for compassionate reasons, taking into account the health of the patient and the safety aspect of being in a hospital environment versus the benefits of social interaction for support and morale.

> "As an integral part of our patient-centred care model, Pembroke Regional Hospital recognizes that family play a vital role in patient care and we continue to assist in facilitating this for those in our care," said Hospital President and CEO Pierre Noel.
